



Uncovering the Environment: The Use of Public Access to Environmental Information Survey for Members of the Public

Project Introduction

Project Information

Thank you for your interest in taking part in the “Uncovering the Environment: The Use of Public Access to Environmental Information” project.

The School of Social Sciences at the University of Dundee is conducting research on the right of access to environmental information. The project seeks to identify how individuals and non-governmental organisations utilise their right to obtain environmental information from Scottish public authorities and the impact of the right on the relationship between public authorities and the general public. The project also aims to explore how the right impacts on the behaviour of public authorities and whether it promotes scrutiny of, and participation in, environmental decision-making processes by members of the public.

By conducting this research, the project will provide insight into how public authorities can better guarantee the right to the benefit of the public and ease the burdens imposed on public authorities in guaranteeing the right. The project's findings will be reported in academic and policy publications and presented at conferences. In addition, the findings will be disseminated in the public domain through a free summary of the research findings prepared by the University of Dundee and the publication of a non-specialist book.

Participant Information

We are seeking individuals who are 18 years or older and who have experience in accessing environmental information from public authorities, either from looking for environmental information proactively made available by public authorities or from submitting a request for environmental information to public authorities, to participate in the project. If you are under 18 years old, please do not participate in this survey, although you can email the research team at s.x.whittaker@dundee.ac.uk to discuss how you can participate in the project.

It is important to highlight that it can be difficult to identify whether you have accessed environmental information that has been made proactively available or not. This is because the release of information before it is requested has become so commonplace that we often do not notice it until it is highlighted.

Measures such as public authorities publishing environmental information on their website, posting leaflets on community notice boards and updating public registers provide examples of how public authorities proactively make environmental information available. These measures can also include posts made on social media such as Facebook or Twitter. If you have encountered environmental information made available through these or similar dissemination methods, you will, if you so wish, be able to participate in the survey and the research project.

If you are interested in participating in the survey, please take a moment to read through the information on the next page to make sure that you are fully informed on the format of the survey and your rights as a participant.

Survey Information

As part of the research project, the research team is carrying out an online survey of those accessing environmental information to identify who utilises the right of access to environmental information and how the information being accessed is used. The findings from this survey, alongside the parallel survey open to public authorities, will provide insight into how the right is working in practice and feed into the wider research project.

Participation in this survey is voluntary, and the answers provided will be anonymised from the point of collection. You may withdraw from participating in the survey and the project at any time.

As part of the project, we would also like to interview some participants to explore in more depth their experiences in accessing environmental information from Scottish public authorities. In order to separate your personal contact details and your answers to this survey we will provide a link that you may follow if you are interested in being contacted for interview at the end of the survey.

You do not need to provide your name or contact details in order to complete this survey.

All data gathered by the research team will be securely stored. The anonymised data will ultimately be archived with the UK Data Service.

Survey Format

The survey should take around 15-20 minutes and consists of a mix of multiple choice questions and free text box questions. The questions you are asked to answer may change depending on your answers to previous questions. You are free to not answer questions if you wish, although we need an answer to a few questions in order to tailor the survey to your experiences

On each page you may click "Next" to continue to the next page or close the survey to exit. Exiting the survey will delete all responses already given and all other details of your participation.

Environmental Information Proactively Made Available by a Public Authority

Under the Environmental Information (Scotland) Regulations 2004, public authorities have a responsibility to proactively make environmental information available rather than waiting for the information to be requested. In this section of the survey, we are interested in your experience with how public authorities fulfilled their responsibility to proactively make environmental information available.

The responsibility to proactively make environmental information available has two key elements. The first of these is that the responsibility relates to "environmental information". "Environmental information" covers a broad range of topics such as the environment itself (including air, water, earth, and the habitats of animals and plants), other things that affect the environment (such as emissions, radiation, noise and other forms of pollution) and policies, plans, measures, reports and laws on the environment.

The second element is the measures used by public authorities to proactively make environmental information available. Measures such as publishing environmental information on a website, posting leaflets on a community notice board and updating public registers are some examples of how public authorities proactively make environmental information available. This is not an exhaustive list of examples, and it is possible that you have encountered environmental information that has been proactively made available through different measures.


