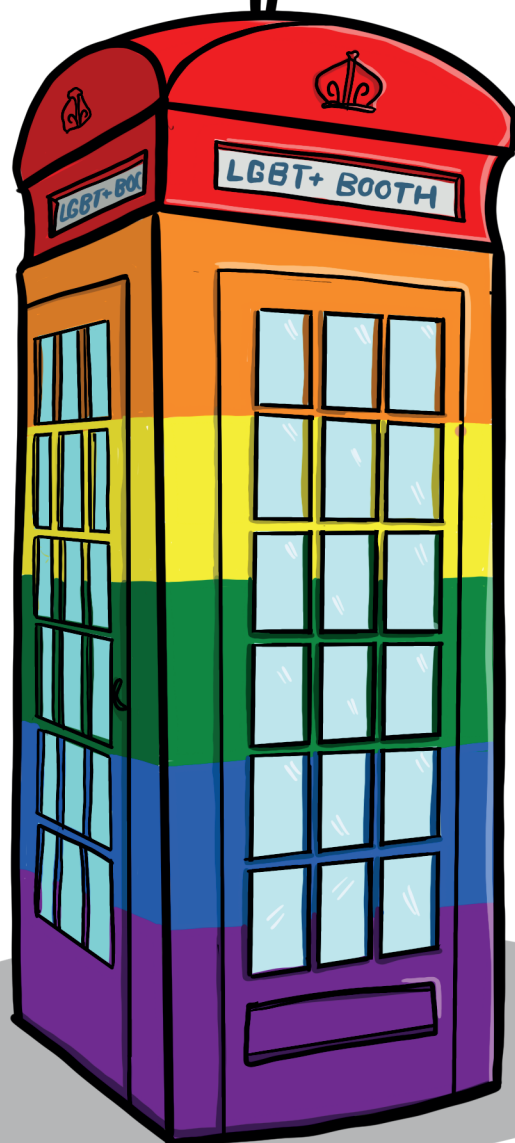


LGBT+ VIDEO BOOTH: INFORMATION FOR EVENT ATTENDEES

WHAT IS IT?

We are researchers from the University of York using a **video booth** to document the experiences of staff who identify as **LGBT+ and their allies**.

Video clips are a way to bring experiences alive for audiences. **You will have the opportunity to record a brief message (max 30 second) about your working life. If you have had experiences of LGBT+ networks we would like to hear about those too.**

WHY IS THIS IMPORTANT?

We have been funded to carry out a major study into **LGBT+ employee networks within the NHS**. So far, we have worked with **9 LGBT+ employee networks** across the U.K., interviewed network members, allies, EDI leads and senior management, and surveyed over **4000 NHS staff**. This has provided insights into how networks operate, who is involved, and their aims and influence.

The video-booth is designed to **give more people a voice to further develop our understanding of LGBT+ identifying staff and their allies within the NHS**.
